Unit 2 - Topic 2 Only:

Use the provided tutorial to help you access your student Web server account. Log in and spend some time exploring the file manager. Do not delete any folders or add any folders at this time.

Once logged into the server, click the IT117-02 folder to open it.

Click the UPLOAD button and browse your computer for the file you want to upload. If you haven't completed your assignment yet, you can upload any file for the purposes of the discussion. Just be sure to delete the uploaded file before logging out if it is a file other than index.html.

Discuss your experience with the server itself, not your experience coding the assignment. Use this opportunity to discuss and find answers to questions you may have and to get help if needed using the file manager, logging into the server, etc.

The standard markup language for Web pages

• The current version of HTML is HTML5

Made up of a collection of elements that display content on a website page

- HTML elements are the building blocks of HTML pages
- HTML elements are represented by tags
 - Tags are coded between < and > brackets

Hypertext Markup Language (HTML)

TextEdit

- •If you are using a Mac, you will need to use TextEdit for assignments 2-9.
 - TextEdit is a free text editor installed on all Mac systems.
- You must set up TextEdit before you can use it to code HTML

Before you code any HTML or add any text, be sure to have TextEdit set up correctly. Double check that you have set TextEdit to **Plain Text** and that you have **disabled Smart Quotes**

HTML Files


Using an editor, HTML is coded into a file

*In this class, you will use MS Notepad (TextEdit)




The file must be saved as a .html file

*File > Save As > type file name and extension > Select All Files



The .html file is converted in the browser into a website page

- *Double click saved file to open in local browser
- *Right click > select Open With > Notepad to edit

The doctype statement

All HTML Web pages require a doctype statement.

- This statement ensures the browser understands how to display the page
- This statement also helps validators know what version of HTML is used

There are different statements for each type of document

- XHTML transitional uses:
- <!DOCTYPE html PUBLIC "-//W3C//DTD XHTML 1.0 Transitional//EN" "http://www.w3.org/TR/xhtml1/DTD/xhtml1-transitional.dtd">
- HTML5 uses:
- <!doctype html>

In this course we will use HTML5 <!doctype html>

You will see this often: <!DOCTYPE html> but in this course we will comply
with the current standard of NO CAPS and use <!doctype html>

The html element




The head is the parent element that holds the title and other elements that do not appear in the browser window

The body element





The body is coded after the head and contains all content that appears in the browser window

Template

Template HTML page

- Should include all structure tags
- Should include layout semantic tags
- Add any elements that will be included in all pages as you develop in upcoming units
- Some advantages of creating and using a template:
 - Promotes uniformity
 - Reduces errors
 - Increases efficiency
 - Faster page load
 - Shorter development time

Template Code

Example:

This is a paragraph. It includes three or four sentences.
A website page may have many paragraphs, but each should be coded using the p tag pair.

HTML Text Supporting Tags

*All page content must be supported by HTML tags

Website page content is often written in paragraph format

- Each paragraph of text is coded between and tags
- A website page paragraph is defined as a set of three or four sentences
- and surrounds each paragraph
- The p tag pair creates a double line break after the text

Other Common Tags

*Empty tags do not require a closing tag as they do not contain content

Some common tags used in pages:

-

 - Creates a line break (single space)
 - Moves an element one line down the page
 - Should **NOT** be used inside or between paragraphs
- <hr>
 - Creates a horizontal line across the page
 - Centered by default


Using Heading (hn) Tags

The hn tags (heading tags where "n" stands for a number 1-6)

Text inside hn tags is set a specific size according to the number used

Text inside hn tags is displayed as bold

- <h1></h1> is the largest heading tag
 - Can only be one per page
 - Required on all pages
- <h6></h6> is the smallest heading tag
 - All headings can be used multiple times on a page, except h1.
- You cannot skip hn tags. If you use h3, you must first use h1 and h2.







Note the double space that is automatically inserted after each hn heading and after the paragraph.

- Note how the hn sizes decrease proportionately.
- Note how each hn heading, regardless of size, is displayed as bold text.

Checking Spelling/Grammar


All code and text content must be manually typed into Notepad/TextEdit.

There is no spell check in these applications

You can copy/paste from Notepad/TextEdit or the browser view into MS Word, Grammarly, etc. to check your spelling and grammar.

However, you CANNOT copy/paste from any outside application back into Notepad/TextEdit.

You will need to manually correct any spelling/grammatical errors directly in Notepad/TextEdit.



Side By Side Development

As you work on your file(s), you will want to be able to see changes in real time.

Open Notepad and your **local browser** side by side

When you add an element or content, save in Notepad. Refresh the local browser to view changes.

Tip: Keyboard shortcut Ctrl + S (Command-S) will save the Notepad (TextEdit) file and keyboard shortcut Ctrl + R (Command-R) will refresh the browser.

Saving Pages in Notepad

Click

Click File > Save As to save pages

Type

- Type the name of the page, including file extension
 - For example: index.html, menu.html, etc.

Select

 Select "All Files" from the Save As Type drop menu

Local File vs Published File

Local files:

- Stored on your computer (or external drive/cloud, etc.).
- Files that only you can access.
- Used while editing.
- Will display in the address bar as a file path (file:// or C:// or E:// etc.)
- In website development, we test our pages in the local browser first, before uploading.

Published files:

Before others can view your website pages, you must **publish** the files. This means you must upload the files to a server.

• For this course, you will use the Purdue Student Web Server to upload and publish your files.

In order to view the published files, the user, (anyone other than you), needs the "address" or URL for the file.

Your URL for the home (index.html) file of your website is provided in the email you received. It will be labeled as:

Your URL is: https://ist2w.purdueglobal.edu/2301C/IT117-0x/Username

This URL, or address, points to the current uploaded index.html file in your IT117-0x folder. This is what you need to submit so I can view and grade your work.

**Always test the uploaded file via the URL before submitting. The local file does not always display exactly the same as the published file

Uploading Website Files

Once your website file is complete, you need to upload it to a server to be visible on the Internet

- 1. Log into the Purdue student Web server
 - a. Use the link and login information provided in the email you received from the server admin
- 2. Click the IT117-02 folder to open it
 - a. Do **NOT** upload into the Home Drive
- 3. Click UPLOAD
 - a. Select Browse to get the file from your computer
- 4. Select the file(s) to be uploaded
- 5. Upload
- 6. View and test your uploaded file(s) using the URL provided in the email
 - a. Remember the local browser is not the same as the live website page

Submitting Assignments

- Attach any file (attachment will not be opened) and copy/paste your URL into the Comments
- **➤** Submit one time only each week

The Dropbox requires an attachment

- I do not open the attachments so you can attach any file you wish
 - Since I do not open attachments, it is never necessary to attach more than one file
- *Attaching your .html file(s) is NOT sufficient for submission
 - I grade the live uploaded file(s) only each week
 - Must submit your URL or I cannot grade your work

**Do not submit the file path from your local browser or the file path from within the server. I cannot access these files and cannot grade your work.
