CBE 2.0 Launch Sept. 3!

September 3, 2018 was the official launch date for CBE 2.0! Here are some **key terms and concepts** provided to new students that can also help you become more familiar with the program structure:

Key Terms and Concepts

- A competency is a "can-do" statement, such as can "define and use marketing terminology and concepts" or can "generate a variety of approaches to addressing a problem."
- Each competency is part of a learning experience called a goal. Goals are made up of three competencies. When compared to a traditional
 college program, a goal is comparable to a course that would be delivered over a series of weeks.
- · Mastery lies at the heart of your program. You will demonstrate your mastery of a competency by successfully completing a project.
- Projects include supporting scenarios, detailed directions for submission, any supporting materials needed to support completion of the
 project, and the rubric that will be used to assess the project and mastery of the competency.
- · The rubric is a detailed list of the specific expectations your project submission must meet to demonstrate mastery of the competency.
- You can resubmit the project until you have demonstrated mastery of all of the rubric criteria. You either complete a project by mastering a
 competency, or you receive a "Not Yet."
- If you receive a "Not Yet" from a reviewer, congratulations! A "Not Yet" indicates that you are on your way to mastering the competency. When you receive a "Not Yet," you will also receive specific feedback from the reviewer.
- A deliverable is what you will work on and what you are expected to submit for the project. Deliverables can be many things, such as essays, videos, audio recordings, etc.
- Learning resources are included in every competency and are recommended for review as you work toward mastery. These resources include
 things like e-books, digital courseware, online articles, videos, interactive activities, and more. You may find these resources helpful to
 understand key concepts that support your mastery of the competency.
